All membership dues are sent to ARRL to be processed and the club receives a commission payment directly from ARRL. No more complicated adjusting funds around credit cards, checks and cash. ARRL does all the processing. As a result, your club could earn money while promoting the many benefits and programs of ARRL to ensure that amateur radio is protected and continues to be strong.

New to Amateur Radio?

Two friends of mine became licensed in December. The seed was planted years ago... Please welcome... KK7PXO, Taylor Brady – General, and KK7QBT, John Green – Technician, to the airwaves.

I received a phone call from John on his way home after the test. He stated that he wanted to tell someone who would celebrate in his accomplishment. So, if you hear them on the airwaves be sure to congratulate them or any newly licensed ham.

Years after planting the seed, to see it sprout so to speak, is a nice reward in and of itself. It caused me to reflect on retention. Consider the following in your efforts to retain those in the hobby.

- 1. Mentorship Programs: Implementing a mentorship program where experienced amateur radio operators (Elmers) are paired with new licensees can provide the guidance, encouragement, and support that newcomers need. This personal connection can help new operators navigate the early challenges of setting up equipment, understanding regulations, and making their first contacts.
- 2. Welcome Packages: Providing new licensees with a welcome package that includes essential information about local clubs, frequencies for local nets, a list of upcoming events, and resources for further learning can be immensely helpful. This not only equips them with valuable information but also

- shows that the amateur radio community is supportive and welcoming.
- 3. Introductory Workshops and Classes: Organizing workshops or classes that cover basic topics such as radio operation, antenna building, and digital modes can significantly boost the confidence of new operators. These sessions should also highlight the various aspects of the hobby, from contesting and DXing to emergency communications and technical experimentation, to spark interest in different areas.
- 4. Involvement in Club Activities: Encouraging new operators to get involved in local amateur radio clubs and participate in their activities can help them build social connections within the community. Clubs should make a concerted effort to involve new members in planning and executing events, which can increase their sense of ownership and commitment to the hobby.
- 5. Access to Equipment: For many new operators, the initial cost of equipment can be a barrier. Clubs or associations could consider establishing a loaner program for radios and antennas to help new operators get on the air without significant upfront investment.
- 6. Recognition and Encouragement: Recognizing the achievements of new operators, whether through awards, certificates, or public acknowledgment in club meetings or newsletters, can have a tremendous impact on their motivation. Celebrating milestones, such as their first DX contact or successful participation in a contest, can reinforce their interest and commitment.
- 7. Promotion of Online Communities and Resources: Pointing new licensees towards reputable online forums, social media groups, and educational resources can help them find answers to their questions, share their experiences, and stay engaged with the global amateur radio community.
- 8. Encouragement of Service and Involvement: Finally, highlighting the role of amateur radio in public service and emergency communications can instill a sense of purpose and pride in new operators. Encouraging participation in events such as Field Day, Simulated Emergency Tests (SETs), and public service activities can demonstrate the real-world impact and importance of their contributions to the community and beyond.

Retention in amateur radio hinges on creating a welcoming, supportive, and engaging environment for new operators. By taking these immediate actions, the community can ensure that newcomers not only stay in the hobby but also thrive and contribute to its growth and vibrancy.
